## **Exploring Witchampton** and Chetterwood















3 As the road and bridleway curve away to the right, go through the gap in the hedge and cross the road at Manswood Farm onto a bridleway which leads through a gate into the woods.

4 Stay on the bridleway until you come to a five-way junction one of tracks. Do not turn sharp left onto the first track but take the left-hand one of the two tracks leading ahead through the wood, then stay on this footpath with the woodland to your left and open views across the fields to your right, as it descends the hill to a T-junction with a bridleway.

5 Turn left to follow the bridleway past farm buildings at Dean Hill and then around to the right to pass Dean Farm and continue until you meet the road.

2 At the bottom of the hill, cross the stile and go straight ahead along the road to pass Zannies Cottages. Stay on the road to return to Witchampton. At the crossroads, take the road ahead of you to pass a row of cottages, then turn right as you reach a former chapel, onto a footpath which takes you downhill to the village hall. Bear left across the village hall car park to meet the road. Before heading uphill to return to the centre of the

village, it is worth making a short detour to the right, downhill
